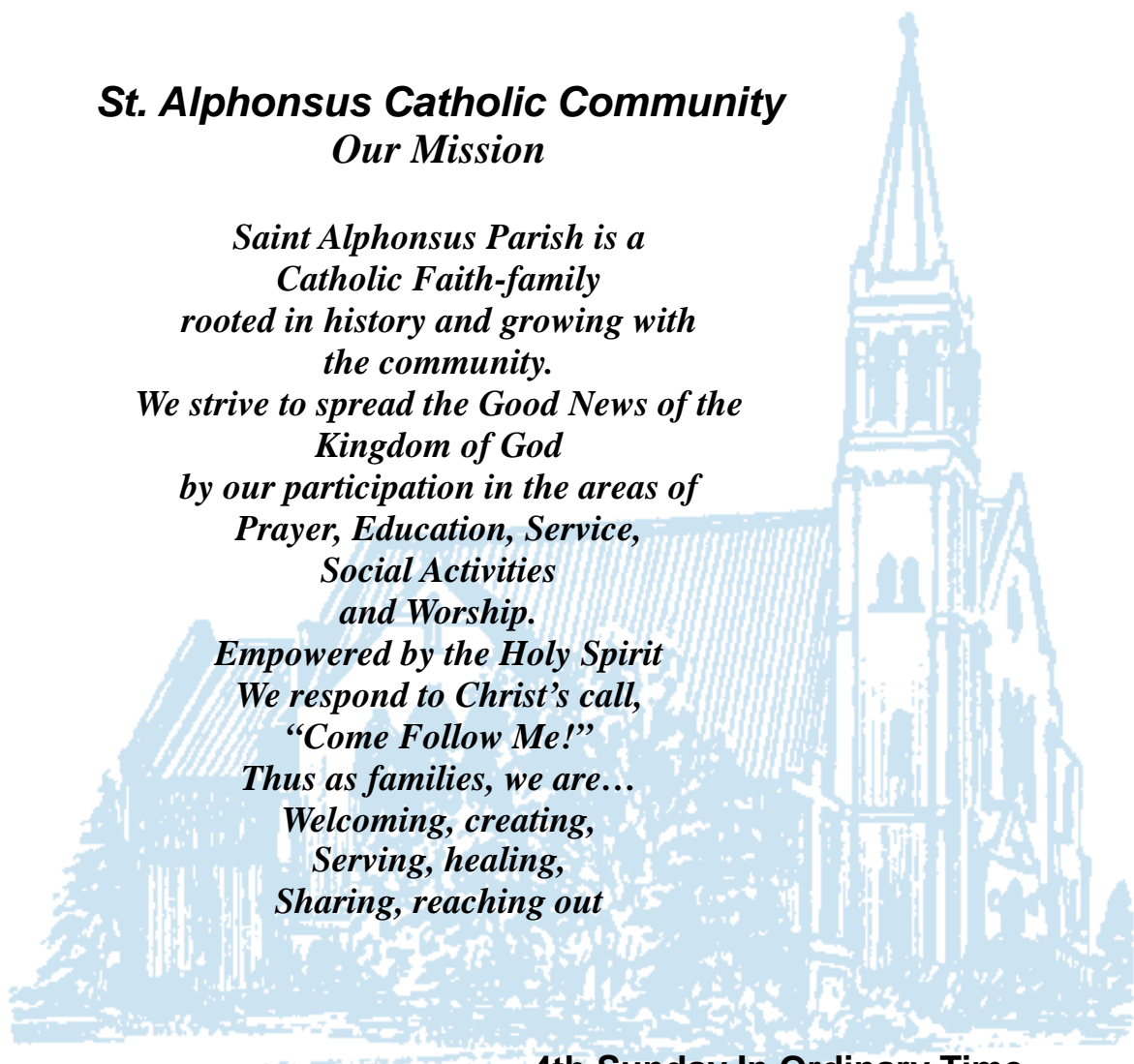

## Fourth Sunday In Ordinary Time

We seldom hear of Zephaniah, the prophet and book from which the first reading is drawn. Zephaniah had the unenviable task of bearing bad news. Judah was in deep trouble at the time. He could and did offer consolation, and we hear those soothing words today. He addresses the "humble of the earth," and tells them to seek the Lord and to seek justice and humility. The word for humble of the earth is *anawin*, that is, "faithful remnant." This remnant is not just the leftovers or castoffs. They are the cream of the crop; they are the salt of the earth. This description of the humble of the earth sounds a lot like those whom Jesus calls "blessed."--which moves us on to the Gospel and the Sermon on the Mount. The Sermon on the Mount is Jesus' inaugural speech. The mountain setting links us with the Old Testament. Jesus is the bringer of a new law. He is on a high mountain, which recalls Moses and Mount Sinai. Here we have a new Moses and a new rule of life. Jesus addresses his disciples and sets forth the qualities that make for blessedness, or beatitude. The blessings reflect those of the faithful remnant, the new *anawim*. Traditionally, we name these blessings the nine Beatitudes.

When Jesus addresses the poor and meek, he addresses the vast majority of inhabitants of our contemporary world. The poor and meek have no power and their habitual role is to defer. In Jesus' time a person's state in life was set by birth and gender.

The author of the Gospel according to Matthew was not sitting in a quiet grassy place writing furiously as the Sermon was delivered. The person who wrote this Gospel lived in a community of witnesses and believers. The community of Matthew in and around 80 A.D. knew Jesus as the one who embodied these Beatitudes. He possessed the qualities of soul his followers also could possess. That is the first thing they needed to know.

It is impossible for us to think as highly of ourselves as God thinks of us. At one time or other in our life, we have all heard someone say, "Who do you think you are?" Well, Jesus would say that whoever we are and whatever the circumstances of birth and gender, we will do just fine. We are candidates for blessedness.

Today's second reading reinforces this. Paul was writing to the Corinthians about the time Matthew's Gospel was being written. The members of the church at Corinth do not possess any special wisdom or inheritance. Their parents are not influential or rich. Paul's little litany of the privileged here is his way of reminding us that we are who we are by the mercy and grace of God, who does not owe us anything. All the little non-entities and no-counts of Corinth count in God's eyes. We know this in the death and resurrection of Jesus and our participation in his life. That is our singular boast, Paul reminds us.

## From the Pastor's Desk


My Brothers and Sisters,

Today, we begin a most interesting series of Gospel passages. Jesus has proclaimed that the "Kingdom of Heaven is at hand." Today, we begin the account of His central teachings. We call it the Sermon on the Mount. Just as Moses climbed Mt. Sinai to receive the Ten Commandments, so now Jesus assembles the crowds on a mountainside and teaches them. These teachings begin with the Beatitudes. They are not meant to replace the Law of Moses. They are a description of what life might be like in the Kingdom of God. These eight sayings announce a new order in which God's love and justice will eventually triumph over evil. We must understand these teachings not as something that will happen at the end of time, but as things that are happening in the minds and hearts of the believers. Understood in this way, the sayings might be rephrased in this way, "The reign of God is coming to those who are poor in spirit" or "God is showing mercy to those who are merciful." This perspective allows us to capture Jesus' emphasis on God's action and to follow where He leads.

Suggestions for reflection:

1. Reflect on the Beatitudes in light of your own present-day circumstances. Which of the Beatitudes is the Spirit calling you to focus on? What must you do to live this Beatitude?
2. Do you know anyone whom our society would consider low-born or despised? What can this person teach you? How could you learn from him or her?

The Sermon on the Mount continues for the next several weeks. We will continue our reflection next week. Until then, know that you are in my prayers, for I am your brother,

ther's great grandmother was named Cora, and when my daughter became sick, God allowed her to go and be with Carly. Carly has had nights of being very ill, recently, she let go of my hand and told me to be quiet, she bowed her head, spoke, said thank you, and then turned to me and asked me if I had seen the hand of Jesus come down and touch her. "Cora had brought Him down to make her better." Yes, the next day my daughter was healthy! Sometimes my daughter will say she knows the names of all of our angels, and will go on with information. What do we encourage, and what do we call a child's imagination? I believe that my daughter has been blessed, but, I guess my question is, how do we approach this with her? Thank you so much for your guidance.

**Response:** I suggest you mostly just listen to your daughter's beautiful faith and suspend your adult skepticism about the "reality" she is dealing with. It does not sound like anything

pathological is going on at this point, and it may well be a special privilege of grace that she is experiencing. So let it be and just support her childlike way of knowing God's love.

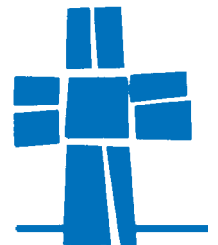

**Treasures From Our  
Tradition**

The prayers surrounding bap-  
tism often speak of being "clothed  
in Christ," and clothes are an im-  
portant consideration. In ancient  
times, adults were probably bap-  
tized without any clothes at all,  
and old texts survive asking people to leave fancy  
garb and jewelry behind as they enter the font.  
Baptism was typically in a private place, the com-  
munity waited elsewhere, and the casting off of  
clothing was hardly a public moment, nor was it  
embarrassing in ancient cultures where privacy  
was largely unknown.

Nonetheless, what was left behind on one side  
of the font was replaced on the other as a white  
robe was wrapped around the newly baptized. It  
was a robe of honor, a dazzling sign of a new be-  
ginning for a society that valued clothing as a sign  
of personal identity. For the newly baptized, a  
whole week in white garments was the rule,  
through the second Sunday of Easter, called  
"Sunday in Albis," because of all the folks wearing  
their baptismal robes.



## Advent/Christmas Family Experiences



It is our hope that the Advent Generations Of Faith event helped families enter into a more meaningful Advent & Christmas. Following are examples of how it went for a few families:

One family shared: "We say a prayer each night before dinner. A very simple prayer-God is Great, etc. During Advent we used the prayers in the book we received at GOF. My children commented on how nice it was to say something different each night. After a few nights they made comments about the themes of the prayers from day to day and week to week. Now that Advent is over, they have returned to saying our usual meal-time prayer but have commented on how nice the Advent prayers were."

Patricia Smith gave an example of how we put our faith into action: "We did quite a few things around Christmas that I thought were meaningful to us. "The picture was taken on Christmas Eve day. Gavin 'Santa' Quinn along with my kids (Sean & Scott Smith) and The Never Quit Org, had a drive for toys and brought them to the Ronald McDonald house. On New Years Eve we gathered up the remaining hat, gloves, shampoos, soaps, hair gels, candy, toys and clothes and went to the Daybreak (homeless shelter) in Joliet. We did it as a family and it was an awesome experience. The boys thought we were going to see Blue Man Group (boy were they surprised). We wanted to show them that there will always be people more fortunate and less fortunate in the world than us, and that they need to be thankful for what they have."

As for the Advent Wreath we made at "Generations of Faith" we took turns reading out of the prayer book and whoever read the prayer that night, lit the candle. One night, I think that was the only light we ate by. It was one of the best, most meaningful Christmas' in a long time!

The Cody family also shared how they helped

the less fortunate celebrate Christmas: "Our 5th and 6th Grade daughters joined us in spending an afternoon shopping for children according to lists we received at a car dealership that had stacks of toys to be sorted. A couple of weeks later, we were able to help throw a Christmas party at a Boys & Girls Club in a poor section of Chicago, and help Santa hand out the toys we had helped sort. Our daughters enjoyed running the 'Pin the Carrot-nose on the Snowman' game; bringing smiles & laughter to children who are less fortunate than they are."

Kevin Cody commented that he was impressed with St. Al's/St. Pat's school's instruction on Scripture reflected in his daughters' knowledge of Old Testament stories and characters revealed in their discussions around the Jesse Tree created at Generations Of Faith. "They raised facts and insights that I wasn't aware of.....we definitely learned from each other!"
