

From Father Brian's Desk

On this weekend we celebrate the Baptism of the Lord. It is an event that signifies Jesus being baptized by John and the beginning of his ministry. It is a ministry that centers on being compassionate towards other people and their needs. I believe that the community of St. Alphonsus Church has compassion as one of their gifts in life.

For example, we offer the opportunity to receive the Eucharist in a Gluten-free form. If you have a medical condition and would prefer to receive the Gluten-free host, we would ask that you try to approach the Eucharistic Minister as one of the last people in line on the right side (the Baptismal font side) of the Church.

As we have already heard on the news or probably have experienced it personally, the cold and flu season is here and in full force. Some of our local hospitals have been directing people to other hospitals because this flu strain has been very contagious and many of the patients and workers have been affected.

I would just like to encourage those who attend weekday and weekend Mass who might be ill to be mindful of those around you. If you are not feeling well, please refrain from shaking hands during the Sign of Peace and receiving from the cup at the Communion Rite.

If you are really not feeling well or think you might be contagious, it might be more considerate to remain at home and watch the weekend liturgy on TV, such as "*Sunday Mass at Mercy Home*" on WGN-TV, Channel 9, on Sunday mornings at 9:30 a.m..

Finally, last week I mentioned about the issue of our lack of parking space on the weekends. We are all fully aware that many of the Lemont churches are limited in regards to space for parking automobiles. Even though we have been blessed with a wonderful and vibrant community here at St. Alphonsus, the lack of parking space is an issue that we have been dealing with for the past number of years. We ask that you be patient with us as we have been trying to find some solutions to this problem.

However, all of us have to be more aware of the "No Parking Zones" and emergency lanes designated to our church grounds. For example, a few weeks ago, a parishioner became ill at one of our Sunday liturgies and we had to call for medical assistance. Even though the paramedics arrived very quickly, they could not get into the church parking lot because all of our entrances were blocked by parked cars.

Because of this instance and many other occurrences in the past, the Lemont Police Department has informed me that if someone is parked in a "No Parking Zone" or is blocking an entrance or emergency lane, they will be ticketed.

Let us try to understand that we are baptized in a faith that encourages us to be considerate of others and act in that way. Rather than believing that our baptism is an end in itself, let us pray that we can practice what our baptismal promises encourage us to do -- by loving God and helping our neighbor.

Welcome Guests and Visitors . . . We're so glad that you're here and invite you to join us in thanksgiving for God's action in our lives. Our goal is to provide a spiritual home where all are welcome, where the healing, reconciling, liberating love of God flows through us to all people. In this way, we believe that the Church is the sacrament of God's saving presence in the world.

"Please come to Mass early enough not to disrupt. Leave late enough not to insult (the Mass does not end until the final blessing). Worship reverently enough not to distract. And dress proudly enough not to offend."

Reflecting on God's Word

This is one of the key moments in the life of Jesus. Up north in his hometown of Nazareth he must have heard about John. At some point an inner voice must have said, "Go south, go to the desert. Go listen to this preacher John."

When he came to the desert, he may have stood in a long line before that moment came when he entered the water and John baptized him. Mark gives us only the briefest account of their meeting, but does present John as expecting someone mightier than he who would baptize with the Holy Spirit.

It is this same Holy Spirit who came down on Jesus as he was coming out of the water. At that moment, the heavens were torn open, heaven reached down to touch the Galilean, and the Spirit descended like a dove. Have you ever seen a gull descend to snatch a fish or a hawk swoop down to seize its prey? By contrast, the image of a descending dove is one of beauty and grace, of gentle alighting.

The words do not announce Jesus to others, as in Matthew's account, but they are spoken only to him: "You are my beloved Son; with you I am well pleased" (1:11), echoing the words the Lord speaks in the first song of the Servant in the book of Isaiah.

The descent of the dove did not mean an easy life for Jesus, but God had penetrated his being in a way that would then drive him into the desert to begin his mission of confronting the powers of sin and death. This gentle dove came—and continues to come—with a mighty power.

THE WATERS OF BAPTISM


When new sod is put in, it needs constant saturation with water. Landscapers say that this "knits" the sod to the soil. The same when a branch is grafted onto a tree: the poultice that joins them at the splice must be kept wet at all times. Water is the stuff that binds the very cells of our bodies together. No wonder religions throughout all times and cultures have used it so prominently. When Jesus stepped into the Jordan for baptism, he "knit" himself to what had come before him. By going to the Jordan, he made himself one with the people of Israel who had crossed it into their Promised Land. With John the Baptist, Christ wove himself into the prophetic tradition that heralded the coming reign of God. He had become fully human in the waters of Mary's womb, and by partaking in the rite of the baptism of repentance, Jesus identified himself with our sinful, frail humanity. It is through the waters of baptism that Christ continues to graft new members onto his Body, the Church; through these waters we are cleansed from sin and filled with the promise of grace, given our destiny for eternal life. For us, as for Jesus, it is also the waters of baptism that inaugurate our mission to proclaim the Good News.

NEW YEAR RESOLUTIONS: POPE FRANCIS' LIST

Just in case you haven't gotten around to making yours, or you want to trade it in for a new one... Here are 10 resolutions based on Pope Francis' most memorable quotes:

1. **Don't gossip.**~ He says when we gossip, we "are doing what Judas did," and "begin to tear the other person to pieces."
2. **Finish your meals.**~ The Pope says: "We should all remember... that throwing food away is like stealing from the tables of the poor, the hungry! Plan your food more responsibly."
3. **Make time for others.**~ We've heard the stories of Pope Francis taking the time to call and write people that he has never met. If he can take a moment to make someone feel appreciated, then so can I.
4. **Choose the 'more humble' purchase.**~ "Cars are necessary," he says, "but take a more humble one. Think of how many children die of hunger and dedicate the savings to them."
5. **Meet the poor 'in the flesh.'**~ It's not enough to give a sandwich if it isn't accompanied by the possibility of learning to stand on one's own feet. Charity that does not change the situation of the poor isn't enough."
6. **Stop judging others.**~ Francis urges us "to keep watch over ourselves." "Let us not forget that hatred, envy, and pride defile our lives!"
7. **Befriend those who disagree.**~ "Others always have something to give me, if we know how to approach them in a spirit of openness and without prejudice."
8. **Make commitments, such as marriage.**~ "I am asking you to rebel against this culture that sees everything as temporary and that ultimately believes that you are incapable of responsibility, that you are incapable of true love. I have confidence in you and I pray for you. Have the courage 'to swim against the tide.' Have the courage to be happy," he says.
9. **Make it a habit to 'ask the Lord.'**~ "Dear young people," he says, "some of you may not yet know what you will do with your lives. Ask the Lord, and he will show you the way."
10. **Be happy.**~ The true Christian, says the Pope, exudes great joy. He says keeping this joy to ourselves "will make us sick in the end."

The Joy of the Gospel - Evangelii Gaudium - Pope Francis Issued in November of 2013



The Joy of the Gospel is the first Apostolic Exhortation issued by Pope Francis and is devoted to the theme of the New Evangelization. New Evangelization-what does that mean and what does it mean to St. Alphonsus?

There was a great deal of publicity around the Pope’s “economic redistribution.” There was an article in NCR that was very critical with the headline, Pope Francis should stick to doctrine, stay away from economic ‘redistribution’. And there were questions about who would supervise this ‘redistribution’. Angels? EU bureaucrats? The UN? etc.

It seems the Pope is asking if people were living the gospel of Jesus what would business look like, what would politics look like, what would individual lives look like? If Jesus was sitting at a board meeting at one of the Dow Jones Index companies what would he stress, what would he call into question, what would he say about profit levels and awareness of the common good? What would the discussion with an average family regarding their finances be if Jesus were sitting with them at the kitchen table? This is not so radical. It has been asked for 2,000 years.

Is there a new and better answer that should be considered?

The Pope voices specific concerns. “Money must serve, not rule! The Pope loves everyone, rich and poor alike, but he is obliged in the name of Christ to remind all that the rich must help, respect and promote the poor. I exhort you to generous solidarity and to the return of economics and finance to an ethical approach with favours human beings.” (58) And “Until exclusion and inequality in society and between peoples are reversed, it will be impossible to eliminate violence.” (59) “Business is a vocation, a noble vocation, provided that those engaged in it see themselves challenged by a greater meaning in life; this will enable them truly to serve the common good by striving to increase the goods of this world to make them more accessible to all. (203) And “Just as the commandment ‘Thou shalt not kill’ sets a clear limit in order to safeguard the value of human life, today we also have to say ‘thou shalt not’ to an economy of exclusion and inequality. Such an economy kills. How can it be that it is not a news item when an elderly homeless person dies of exposure, but it is news when the stock market loses two points? This is a case of exclusion.” (53)






