Welcome Guests and Visitors . . . We're so glad that you're here and invite you to join us in thanksgiving for God's action in our lives. Our goal is to provide a spiritual home where all are welcome, where the healing, reconciling, liberating love of God flows through us to all people. In this way, we believe that the Church is the sacrament of God's saving presence in the world.

"Please come to Mass early enough not to disrupt. Leave late enough not to insult (the Mass does not end until the final blessing). Worship reverently enough not to distract. And dress proudly enough not to offend."

Reflecting on God's Word

Once more we stand with John the Baptist and learn from what he does. Watching Jesus walk by, he says to two of his disciples, "Behold, the Lamb of God." And "the two disciples heard what he said and followed Jesus" (John 1:36-37). One was Andrew, who, in turn, goes to his brother Simon and brings him to Jesus. And Jesus gives him a new name, Cephas, which means "rock."

A new life begins for Andrew and Simon, and most likely for the other disciple as well, possibly either James or John (both were fishermen with Peter and Andrew). It was clear to Jesus that they were searching for something: "What are you looking for?" They answered, "Teacher, where are you staying?" implying that it was going to take more than a few minutes to answer that question. Jesus took them in immediately: "Come, and you will see . . . And they stayed with him that day" (John 1:38-39).

As we return to Ordinary Time, which comes from the Latin *ordo* ("numbered"), we count the weeks off by numbers: Second Sunday, Third Sunday, and so on. But "ordinary time" is lived in a world touched by God's grace. God continues to come into our lives, if we would notice.

Like John pointing out Jesus to his two disciples, the old priest Eli helps Samuel to understand that the Lord is entering the boy's life and tells him to respond, "Speak, LORD, for your servant is listening" (1 Samuel 3:9). We bring each other to God, to Jesus Christ, by being attentive to how God is at work among us. God continues to work through each of us, and that is what makes "ordinary time" continuously extraordinary.



WATCHING FOR THE MESSIAH

Today's Gospel story of John and his disciples seeing and following Jesus sounds so simple and casual, it's easy to miss the significant acts of faith that are made.

John points to Jesus: "Look," he says, "there is the Lamb of God." John's faith in Jesus is evident, so evident that John's disciples immediately leave his side to follow this Jesus.

The two disciples make their own act of faith. They follow Jesus, spend time with him, and are quick to spread the good news of their discovery: "We have found the Messiah."

It is easy to forget that the expectations of generations, the hopes of many ages of faithful people were being fulfilled in these simple acts of faith. The Lamb of God, the Messiah, foretold by the prophets, had finally come. Nearly everyone among the Jewish people was watching for the Messiah back then; who in our own society watches for signs of the presence of the Messiah today?

OUR CURRICULUM AND ASSESSMENTS

With our young people having recently taken mid-term assessments and Progress Reports going home, it seems like a good time to briefly review how our curriculum is developed in an age-appropriate manner, and the purpose of assessments.

We rely on the guidance of the Archdiocesan Office for Catechesis and the publishers who have done much research in, and had many years of experience with, putting together age-appropriate materials both for schools and parish religious education programs. When we first decided to go with the Faith First/Be My Disciples series, I assembled a team of professional educators from our parish who were familiar with curriculum development to establish what we call "Core Objectives" for each of the grade-levels... so that we could simplify the learning outcomes and ensure systematic & comprehensive coverage. These can be found in the Parent Handbook on our website.

The St. Alphonsus *Religious Education Advisory Board* and I took the Chicago Archdiocesan Religion Curriculum Guidelines for each grade when they came out several years ago and used it as a tool to compare against our curriculum and make revisions where necessary. So, our curriculum for each grade follows Archdiocesan Guidelines.

We recognized that there is a lot of material to cover in the textbooks over the course of 20 sessions, so we spread out the learning objectives established by the Archdiocese over the grade-levels so that each grade can focus on, and give proper attention to, those objectives.... anything else covered in the textbooks is gravy. We are able to do this because of the spiral method of catechesis that our textbook series uses. By using the "4 pillars" of our faith that make up the units of the textbooks for all of the grades (and the sections of the *Catechism of the Catholic Church*), the kids touch upon the same concepts just about every year. They receive greater emphasis in the grades where they are part of the Core Objectives.

We use assessments as a tool to let the catechists know how the children are retaining the concepts that they are teaching, and as a means of assimilating what they have learned over the past few months. There are no grades, and no permanent records. We try to avoid using the term "test" so that they are not associated with the "getting good grades" goals in their schools. It is our hope that knowing this, the children won't be as stressed out by taking an assessment. If a child does poorly on the 23 question multiple-choice assessment, that's fine ... catechists and parents then know where the child needs help. There's no passing, failing, or holding back.

Regarding the pedagogy used, we talk to our catechists about making the sessions fun, and recognizing the different learning styles and short attention spans of kids, This requires mixing it up with activities, games, videos, stories, etc. Please feel free to contact me if you have any questions or concerns.




