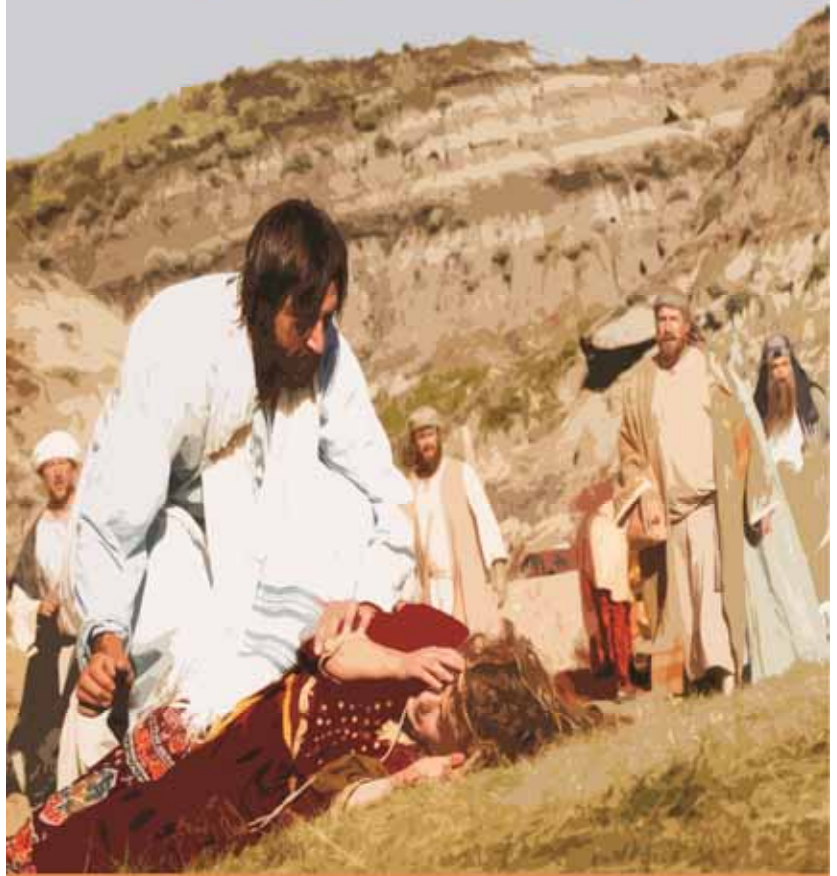

## Reflecting on God's Word

Sue loves to iron clothes. In the process, she says, she also irons out her life, all its wrinkles and creases. She says she can stand neither her clothes nor her life when they're all rumped. John runs every day. A lot of folks do. He hasn't missed a day in five years. But it's also where he and they pace out the rhythms of their lives. More than one frazzled mother has locked herself in the bathroom for twenty minutes of solitude and quasi-peace. Sometimes deserts look like bathrooms. Even teenagers know the need, so they crank up some tunes, stretch out on their beds, and listen beyond the music to the melodies played upon their lives.

I suspect there is a lot going on in those spaces. That's where kids get raised and loves get sorted and businesses are merged and decisions unraveled and re-raveled. But somewhere in the midst of it all we also make some decisions about who and what we want to become in this life—at any age. That's where goodness has a chance to surface and values are affirmed and commitments are remade for the umpteenth time and faith sprouts forth. And then it becomes prayer, out of the silence and the stillness and the darkness of time spent alone.

With Paul, Jesus could have said, "Woe to me if I do not preach" that good news.

## A DEATH IN THE FAMILY



It seems to be that time of year when families experience death of loved ones. We are then faced with the challenge of explaining what happens when we die to our young ones. We look for something familiar to the child to explain the unfamiliar. In this case, we can refer to the wonder of a butterfly. We can explain that one reason God gave us butterflies is to help us understand what happens when we die. The body of the butterfly is the same body that it had when it was a caterpillar, but it has been transformed., which means it looks different. When we die, Jesus will come and take our body and make it completely new so that it will never die again.

Time & space are more limiting for a caterpillar than for a butterfly... a butterfly can fly and move more quickly, while a caterpillar moves very slowly and does not travel very far on a daily basis. When Jesus makes us new, time & space will not be limits at all. We call this heaven. Heaven is living in complete happiness with God. There is no sadness or pain.

We believe this because this is what happened to Jesus when he died. God came to him and made his body completely new. Jesus promised the same eternal life for us. All limits of time & space that Jesus experienced when he walked among us in history were erased with his Resurrection and Ascension into heaven. His Resurrection and Ascension made him present at all times and places.

Imagine the joy that this kind of existence would bring! Without the limits of time & space grandma doesn't have to wait to see anyone or do anything! What else can you imagine without the limits of time & space?

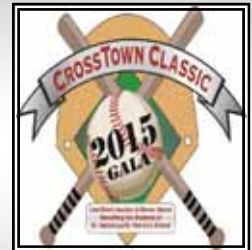

## The Joy of the Gospel - Evangelii Gaudium - Pope Francis Issued in November of 2013



The Joy of the Gospel is the first Apostolic Exhortation issued by Pope Francis and is devoted to the theme of the New Evangelization. New Evangelization-what does that mean and what does it mean to St. Alphonsus?

Our new Archbishop Cupich is a self-proclaimed fan of the Pope's theology and intent for mission. In June of 2014, shortly after the encyclical was released the Pope faced criticism regarding what was thought to be his economic criticism of the West. Cardinal Oscar Andres Rodriguez Madaiga, SBD, was asked to speak to the critics regarding libertarianism. Then Bishop Cupich was asked to respond to that response with the United States/the West in mind.

**Just to be safe; Merriam Webster defines libertarian as-a person who believes that people should be allowed to do and say what they want without any interference from the government. It is an integral aspect of 'free markets'.**

Bishop Cupich went on to address his second point in the response. "Secondly...some of the Pope's critics say that his views on the economy are wanting precisely because he speaks out of the limited experience of living in Argentina with its difficult economic and political history or that he is just uninformed about capitalism and a market economy, especially its claims of reducing global poverty. But I think those who easily dismiss what the Pope is saying because of his turn to real life experience fail to appreciate that he is calling people to a more authentic way of knowing and learning. He is challenging them about how they are informed....Instead of approaching life from the thirty thousand feet level of ideas, he challenges policy makers and elected officials-indeed all of us to experience the life of everyday and real people. His pithy phrase in the Joy of the Gospel says it all: Reality is greater than ideas."

Bishop Cupich drew some very stark contrasts:

- \*"For Francis the human person seeks and claims an integral development, morally, spiritually and emotionally, which is joined intrinsically to the communities that sustain him. For the Pope's critics, the human person is the autonomous individual, man the producer and man the consumer.
- \* For Francis inclusion and economic security for all are measures of economic health in contrast to the one-dimensional measure of economic growth proposed by his critics for decision making in the growing age of globalization.
- \*For Francis, politics seeks the common good. For his libertarian critics, politics seeks to maximize the freedom of market and individual choice.
- \* For Francis the strength of globalization leads to the need for global structures that help mold the forces of market capitalism to advance solidarity and dignity for all. For libertarians market forces left to themselves are the best arbiters of economic progress."
