Reflecting on God's Word

All of us wish we could be holy, we say, if only Jesus would come and do to the temple of our faith what he did to the temple of Israel's faith: cast out what doesn't belong, because we don't seem to be able to do it for ourselves, at least not with much effectiveness. We try to pray and find ourselves daydreaming about what to make for supper, about the latest family argument, about the meeting we're going to attend, about where we're going to spend our money.

We try to simplify, but we also like our lives the way they are. We like the cut of style, the thick of our lawn, the escape of vacation, the high from shopping or chocolate or daytime soaps or whatever catches our fancy. We wish we would love better, care better, have more compassion or patience, be more generous, but original sin always gets in the way—only we don't call it original sin. We say we don't have willpower or the energy.

So what are we to do? John's Gospel promises that God will come and drive such stuff from our lives. In fact, the promise is that God will do it whether we wish God to or not, which is probably a good move on God's part simply because most of us are a bit fearful of what God may clear away.

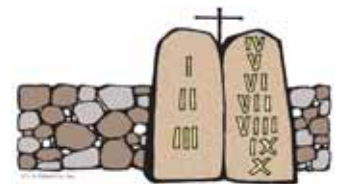

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THE PATH TO FREEDOM

Most of us, if we were asked "Does the phrase 'the Ten Commandments' appear in the Bible?" would likely get it wrong, because the answer is "no." "The Ten Commandments" is a post biblical, phrase that developed along with an image of God as police officer that is not found in today's passage from Exodus. The first phrase is the key: God is the one who brings us out of slavery; following God's law or commands is our path to freedom. The moneychangers whom Jesus drove from the temple were not explicitly breaking any of the commandments, but neither were they helping people to find God's path to freedom as they came to worship at the temple. This is an important Lenten lesson for us. We need to stop asking ourselves whether or not we are breaking specific rules or regulations and instead examine our lives to see if we are truly following a path to God's freedom through Christ.

The Joy of the Gospel - Evangelii Gaudium - Pope Francis Issued in November of 2013



The Joy of the Gospel is the first Apostolic Exhortation issued by Pope Francis and is devoted to the theme of the New Evangelization. New Evangelization-what does that mean and what does it mean to St. Alphonsus?

To evangelize is to make the kingdom of God present in our world (176).

The Pope's exhortation is very clever in that the end of the exhortation leads us right back to the beginning. In the fourth chapter, "The Social Dimension of Evangelization", the Pope points out that our faith and our mission is not a private affair nor one that can be done secretly. "Nor should our loving response to God be seen simply as an accumulation of small personal gestures to individuals in need, a kind of 'charity a la carte', or a series of acts aimed solely at easing our conscience. The Gospel is about the kingdom of God; it is about loving God who reigns in our world. To the extent that he reigns within us, the life of society will be the setting for universal fraternity, justice, peace and dignity. Both Christian preaching and life, then, are meant to have an impact on society" (180). And "Consequently, no one can demand that religion should be relegated to the inner sanctum of personal life, without influence on societal and national life, without concern for the soundness of civil institutions, without a right to offer an opinion on events affecting society...the Church 'cannot and must not remain on the sidelines in the fight for justice'"(183). "These issues are first, the inclusion of the poor in society, and second, peace and social dialogue" (185).

And how do we accomplish this in society and in the world? By living the Joy of the Gospel. One of the Advent devotional booklets was taken from the writings of Pope Francis. One of them "Meeting God in God's Word" was instructive.

"In God's presence, during a recollected reading of the Bible, it is good to ask for example: "Lord, what does this text say to me? What is it about my life you want to change by this text? What troubles me about this text? Why am I not interested in this? Or perhaps: What do I find pleasant in the text? What is it about this word that moves me? What attracts me? Why does it attract me?"

"But even when we make an effort to listen to the Lord, some common temptations can arise. One of them is simply to feel troubled or burdened, and to turn away. Another is to think about what the text means for other people, and so avoid applying it to our own life. Or we might look for excuses to water down the clear meaning of the text. Or we can wonder if God is demanding too much from us, asking for a decision that we are not yet prepared to make. This leads many people to stop taking pleasure in the encounter with God's word. But God always invites us to take a step forward and does not demand a full response if we are not yet ready. God simply asks that we sincerely look at our life and present ourselves honestly before him, and that we be willing to continue to grow, asking from him what we ourselves cannot as yet achieve." St. Alexander Parish Hosts

"Sacred Cloths"

a presentation on the Shroud of Turin and the Sudarium of Oviedo

Wednesday, March 11th at 7:00 PM

Faith Based Communications Shroud presentation entitled, "Sacred Cloths" deals with both the Shroud of Turin and the Sudarium of Oviedo. It takes the audience through the history of each cloth, the scientific analyses that have been done, current data that refutes the C-14 dating of the Shroud, analogies between the Man of the Shroud and Jesus through scripture, etc. The inability to explain the mechanism by which the image on the Shroud was created is also explored, along with the unique photo-negative and 3D characteristics of the image.

Finally, the link between the two cloths having been in contact with the same crucified person, and its implications are examined. Exhibit materials include full size Shroud images (both positive and negative), as well as crown of thorns, crucifixion nails, flagellum (whip), biblical coins. The presentation will take place in the church and runs 70-80 minutes with time afterward for questions and discussion.

Presenter Richard Bernatchez, cofounder of Faith Based Communications, has an intense interest in the subjects presented by FBC and has done considerable research in each of the areas. He and his wife have been active in religious education at the parish level.
