From Father Brian's Desk

As we celebrate Palm Sunday this weekend, it gives us an opportunity to reflect on the life of Jesus, but also be proud of who we are as Christians. Palm Sunday was a joyous time for the followers of Jesus over 2000 years ago as they waved their palm branches proclaiming Jesus as their new king. We, as Christians and Catholics, realize that Palm Sunday is the beginning of the holiest weeks of the year. That being said, I would like to invite you to take advantage of some of the opportunities for prayer this Holy Week.

On **Monday, March 30th**, there will be a wonderful chance to prepare for Easter through the Sacrament of Reconciliation. Our annual **Lemont Tri-Parish Reconciliation Service** will take place at **Ss. Cyril & Methodius from 5:00 p.m. – 6:00 p.m. and from 7:00 p.m. – 8:00 p.m.** There will be a number of priests present who will listen to Confession and share the great prayer of Absolution. Some of the priests will be able to listen to Confession in English and Polish.

Holy Thursday is a great celebration of the Last Supper and the idea of service to others. During our Holy Thursday Liturgy on **April 2nd at 7:00 p.m.**, members of the parish will have their feet washed as a remembrance of Jesus washing the feet of the Apostles. After the conclusion of the Holy Thursday Liturgy, the church will remain open until **11:00 p.m.** for Adoration of the Blessed Sacrament.

On **Good Friday**, we recall the death of our Lord Jesus Christ. On Friday, **April 3rd at 3:00 p.m.**, we will offer a **Good Friday Prayer Service with Veneration of the Cross and Holy Communion**.

The **Easter Vigil on Holy Saturday at 7:00 p.m.** is considered by the Catholic Church as the greatest celebration of our faith. Not only do we celebrate the Resurrection of Jesus Christ, but we also welcome our new members into our community through Baptism, First Eucharist and Confirmation.

The commemoration of the Resurrection of Jesus Christ at the Easter Vigil and Easter Sunday is a wonderful occasion to be proud to be called Christian and Catholic. Through prayers, readings, music and song, we come together as a community of believers in Jesus, but we also thank God for everything that we have already.

Please join us for the holiest week of the Church year as we celebrate our faith!

Welcome Guests and Visitors . . . We're so glad that you're here and invite you to join us in thanksgiving for God's action in our lives. Our goal is to provide a spiritual home where all are welcome, where the healing, reconciling, liberating love of God flows through us to all people. In this way, we believe that the Church is the sacrament of God's saving presence in the world.

"Please come to Mass early enough not to disrupt. Leave late enough not to insult (the Mass does not end until the final blessing). Worship reverently enough not to distract. And dress proudly enough not to offend."

Reflecting on God's Word

Someone once told me that people come to church on Palm Sunday because they get something. But I like to think that palm says something they recognize as true.

"He emptied himself, taking the form of a slave, coming in human likeness," writes Paul, quoting the words of an early Christian hymn. "He humbled himself, becoming obedient to the point of death, even death on a cross," follow soon after (Philippians 2:7, 8). Emptying and humbling are the two key words embracing the trajectory of the life of Jesus Christ, the Son of God: from incarnation to passion and death.

He poured himself out for us and for our salvation, certainly suffering physically—from the beating, the scourging, the crowning with thorns, being struck with a reed, spat upon, prodded, pushed, and stumbling up the hill to Golgotha. Then he was stretched out on a crossbeam, nailed to it, and lifted up, his body suspended between heaven and earth. Finally, he suffocated, unable to raise himself to take in more air.

There was also the inner suffering of abandonment, of seeing his disciples run off, of realizing that all those who had cried "Hosanna" a few days earlier had either been silent or had cried out, "Crucify him." Only the women had remained with him.

Today, when we take home a piece of palm, it invites us to prepare to renew our baptismal promises on Easter. Then we can add our voices to that solitary voice almost two millennia ago, saying, "Truly, this is the Son of God!" (Mark 15:39).

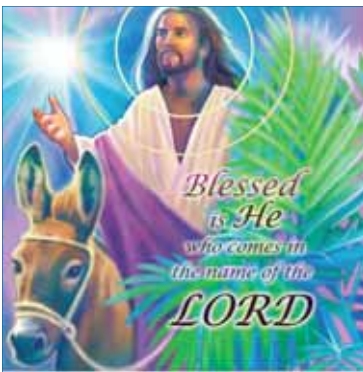
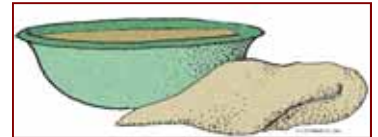

The solemnity of today's readings invites us into silent contemplation of the mystery of our redemption. There are so many levels on which to understand the events of the Passion. The woman who anoints Jesus acts prophetically in a way that the other disciples do not yet grasp. Anointing is for priests, prophets, and kings, and also for the preparation of the dead. It is for healing and for holiness. Her action acknowledges the imminent events of the passion and death of the Lord, and points toward his resurrection and triumph over evil and death. He is priest and victim, prophet and God, King and Lord. All these things are acknowledged in her prophetic anointing.

Many of our 4th and 5th grade Girl Scouts from Troop 368 recently worked to earn the Puella Mariae Medal and received their award at Mass on Sunday, March 8, 2015. The proud recipients included 5th graders Bridget, Ryan E., Sabrina, Scarlett, Regan, Bianca and Ashley. Fourth grade Girl Scouts Nicole, Jessica, Eileen, and Annalise also earned this important symbol of their faith to Mary.

The Puella Mariae Medal is a special recognition that the Archdiocese of Chicago awards to youth for advancement in religious knowledge and spiritual formation. The Latin name means "Child of Mary." The Puella Mariae program is designed for junior level Girl Scouts to share discussions about and devotions to Mary. The scouts had to read about the life of Mary and discuss what kind of a person she must have been. The girls learned about the many Feast Days of Mary, including when each feast day occurs and why the church celebrates it. Learning how to pray the Rosary and follow the mysteries of the rosary and learning to pray the Memorare helped to bring the scouts closer to Mary. These are just a few of the things these Girl Scouts accomplished on their journey of faith as they sought to earn their Puella Mariae medal. Their dedication and faithfulness are a great example for all students.



Student Council Lenten Service Project for Oxfam



Oxfam America is a global organization working to right the wrongs of poverty, hunger, and injustice. Oxfam saves lives, develops long-term solutions to poverty, and campaigns for social change. Of the 10.9 million children who die each year, poor nutrition plays a role in at least half these deaths.

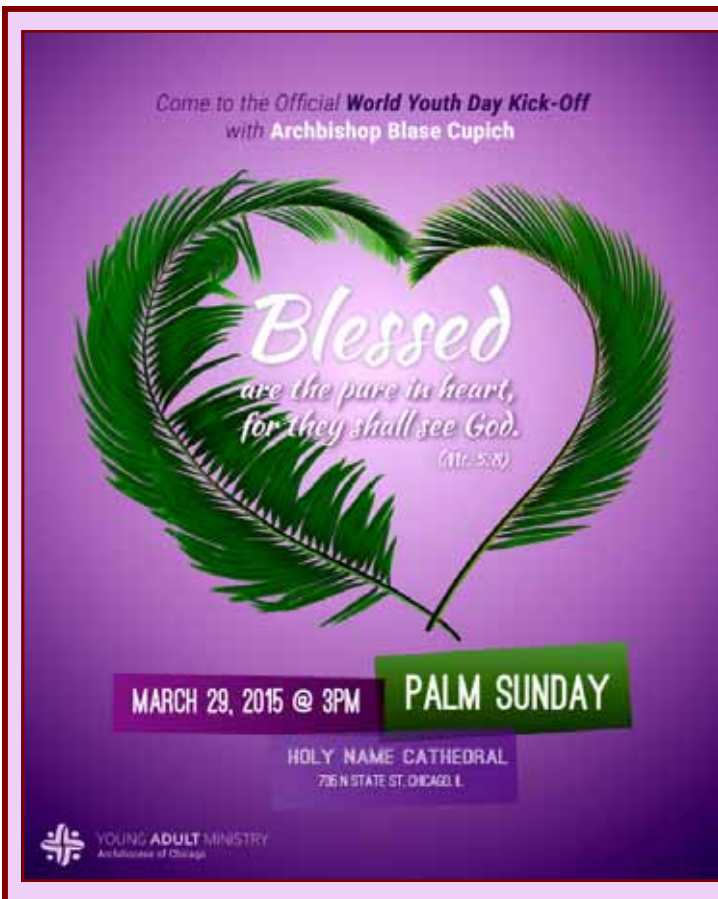

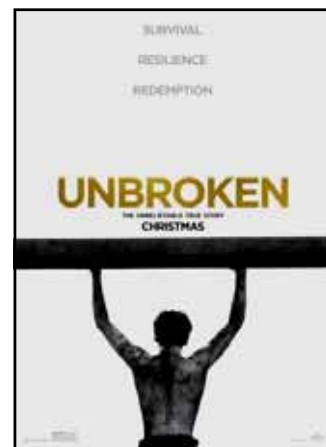


Parish Movie Night
