



Reflecting on God's Word

Often we are unable to identify the truth in our lives. Is our passion love or lust? Is our financial security greed or wise preparation? Is the raising of our children good discipline or carving them into our own image and likeness? Is our religiosity superstition or faithfulness to the tradition? Do our dreams nurture the Kingdom of God or the Tower of Babel? In other words, is it from God or is it from the Other Side? So we look about us, and because our neighbors' lives seem little different from our own, we look into any self-help harbor that seems able to shelter us from aimless drifting.

Most of us, I suspect, wonder if there is anyone who knows the deepest truths, whether they be about life or about our world or even about ourselves. So we find ourselves gathering about Jesus, though even then some may do so half-heartedly—at times trusting that he will have some sort of answer and at other times wondering if he indeed does, yet not knowing where else to go. And so we gather, like sheep around a shepherd, simply because every other voice has been heard and found wanting.

CHRIST'S PRESENCE IN THE WORLD

There's a bit of a "missing link" in the first two sentences of today's Gospel from Mark. In the first, the apostles return from having been sent out on mission two by two ("one who is sent" is the meaning of "apostle"). Their instructions were to preach repentance, drive out demons, and heal the sick in Jesus' name. In the second sentence, Jesus tells them to come away with him and rest a while. It would be nice for us to imagine that, between those two sentences, a look of amazed gratitude and pleasure crossed the face of Jesus as he heard of the kingdom proclaimed in his

name, and how they didn't have to shake the dust off their feet anywhere. They deserved a rest! It might not be bad for us, when we gather together with Jesus as the apostles do today, to do this kind of debriefing, allowing the Lord to hear what we've sought to do in his name, our successes, our failures, our need to get away with him for a while to be fortified for further work in God's name. For we, the baptized, are not only the flock of Jesus Christ; through water and the power of the Spirit we have also become the Body of Christ, the presence of the Shepherd for the life of the world.

LIVING MY FAITH THIS SUMMER

It is a long time between our last session in April and our 1st session in October. We offer the following ideas to continue your child's faith formation over these summer months by grade-level, beginning with **3rd Grade**:

- Lead your family in the dinner prayer.
- Volunteer to bring up the gifts at Mass as a family.
- Pray the Apostles Creed.
- Pray the Rosary outdoors... at the statue of Mary in the front of the church, or at the one off the back parking lot.
- Volunteer at the "Feed My Starving Children" sites in Aurora or West Chicago (www.FMSC.org).
- Attend "Concert on the Lawn" this Sunday evening as a family..



CATHOLIC Q & A ~ *How do I talk to family & friends who disagree with Catholic teaching regarding same-sex marriage?*

We want to maintain the peace within the family and not harm our relationships with friends. At the same time, we don't want to surrender what we believe to be true. Author, Sr. Aletheia Noble, offers the following 5 tips when friends and family disagree on gay marriage:

1. **Believe in the Good Intentions of the Other:** Sr. Noble thinks the main reason this issue is difficult to talk about is the unfortunate way that it has been framed: to be against gay marriage is to be a bigot. (And on the other side, to be for gay marriage is to support the downfall of Western civilization as we know it). She contends that dialogue is impossible if one person is unable to recognize the good intentions of the other person.
2. **Love the Truth:** If both people can agree that there *is* truth and that dialogue is one way to reach the truth, then you can have a fruitful conversation. But if one person believes that he or she already has a monopoly on truth, then the conversation is already over.
3. **Leave Your Defenses Behind:** If we cannot talk about a topic without tripping over our ego and defenses, it is going to be hard to find common ground with others. Truth can only be found when we are willing to lay down our defenses and humbly search for it with others.
4. **Follow God's Will:** Sr. Noble acknowledges that she often does not take the time to ask God where he wants a discussion to go. But she suggests that asking God what he wants before launching into our own monologues is important. Sometimes God wants us to just shut up. And other times he wants us to be brave and discuss our beliefs even if we don't feel prepared. Either way, it makes sense to listen to God's ideas before our own.
5. **Embrace the Sword but Don't Swing It:** Jesus told us that he did not come to bring peace but the sword (Mt 10:34). As Christians, we are called to be open, inviting and respectful of others. But sometimes the sword of truth causes division. Sr. Noble doesn't think Christians are called to do the sword wielding and ostracizing. But she does believe if our friends and family do not understand where we are coming from, and if they even feel like they have to reject our love, we *do* need to accept the pain with serenity and grace (rather than changing our position).




