"Please come to Mass early enough not to disrupt. Leave late enough not to insult (the Mass does not end until the final blessing). Worship reverently enough not to distract. And dress proudly enough not to offend."

Reflecting on God's Word

My earliest memory of a widow was Aunt Lizzie: white-haired, seemingly very old, but kindly. (I was four, so she was probably in her sixties then—how one's perspective on age changes with time!) She lived with my godmother and uncle, having contributed some of her savings to help them buy a house. My second memory was of Lana Turner playing *The Merry Widow* in the 1952 movie of the same name. Both were light years away, historically and culturally, from the widows in today's readings.

The widows in biblical times were imperiled. If they did not have sons who would care for them, their very lives could be endangered. The widow in the first reading has a young son; she is collecting sticks to build a fire to prepare the last of her flour so they can eat and die. When Elijah asks her to prepare a cake for him, she generously does so—which proves to be her salvation. Later he even restores her son to life.

Jesus watches a widow put in her last—literally—two cents in the temple's coffers. He has previously warned about the scribes who "devour the houses of widows" while reciting lengthy prayers (Mark 12:40). Some say Jesus is lamenting the foolishness of this widow, like the prophets of the past who railed against the neglect of widows and orphans. But most think he is praising her generosity in giving "all she had, her whole livelihood" (12:44). Like her, Jesus will soon put all his trust in the Father.

GIVING ALL

Trusting widows play a significant role in this weekend's readings. At the point of poverty, when giving even the smallest amount of what they had could imperil their health and well-being, they trusted God and gave anyway. What is important about their giving is not what or how much they gave, but how they gave it. Without selfishness, they gave to help others. Their giving was from the heart, with little hope or intention of receiving any sort of reward or recognition for their generosity. The monetary values of the widows' gifts were small, but their value measured in the Kingdom was priceless.

There is a significant similarity between their gift and the gift Jesus gave each of us. The widows offered their lives for God. Jesus offered his life for us.

Religious Education Update

FALL FAMILY SESSIONS THIS WEEK FOR GRADE-LEVELS 1 & 2



The sessions will take place this week in the classrooms on Track A & B, and in the Church Hall on Track C. Parents join their children for the lesson, discussion, and activities. In this session, we will take a look at a man who has been in the news a lot lately.. Pope Francis. We will discuss how he and the Church helps families live out our mission to love.

Our 4th & 5th Grade-level young people and their parents learned about and made their own rosaries, then used them for the first time.



RELIGION AND FAMILY STABILITY

There is a growing consensus that America needs to pursue policies aimed at re-strengthening the family. The beneficial effects of religious worship on family stability clearly indicate one way to help accomplish this. Professors Darwin L. Thomas and Gwendolyn C. Henry of Brigham Young University's Department of Sociology sum up research on the quest by young people for meaning and love: "Research on love clearly indicates that for many, love in the social realm cannot clearly be separated from love that contains a vertical or a divine element.... Young people see love as the central aspect of the meaning of life; they believe that religion is still important in helping form judgments and attitudes." Their conclusion: "family and religious institutions need to be studied simultaneously in our efforts to understand the human condition better." There is a relationship between family solidarity -- family health if you will -- and church affiliation and activity. In their studies churchgoing people were more likely to be married, remain married and to be highly satisfied with their marriages.

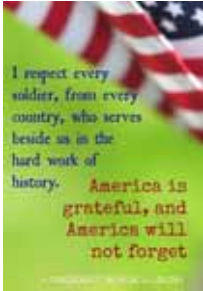


FIRST RECONCILIATION PARENT MEETING Tuesday, 11/17 at 7:00 P.M. in the Church Hall

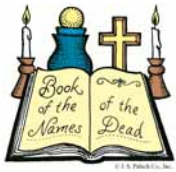

Tri-Parish Anointing of the Sick Bilingual Mass



On Saturday, November 14th, SS. Cyril & Methodius Parish will celebrate the Anointing of the Sick at the 11 AM Mass. This will be a bilingual (English-Polish) Mass.

We extend an invitation to those in our Tri-Parish Family who feel that the Celebration of Anointing

will provide help for them in sickness and aging of their bodies.

In the past, the Anointing was done near the time of death. Theology today understands Anointing as the Sacrament of the sick rather than at the time of approaching death. The Anointing of the Sick is the prayer of Christ and His Church for the physical and spiritual health of the sick person.

Who may be Anointed?

- ❖ A sick person may be Anointed before he/she undergoes surgery, whether or not the surgery is serious.
- ❖ Persons with chronic illness.
- ❖ Older persons, even if they are not suffering from dangerous illness.
- ❖ Mentally disabled persons and chemically dependent persons.
- ❖ A sick child may be Anointed in order to be comforted and uplifted by the Sacrament.
