From Father Brian's Desk

Thanksgiving Day

This Thursday we celebrate Thanksgiving Day. Even though some people believe that it is merely a day to eat turkey, watch hours and ho N.F.L. Football or preparing to shop for early Christmas sales, it is actual more than that. I believe that it is a wonderful opportunity for people to gather together and reflect on everything we have been blessed with in life.

As Christians and Catholics should try to give thanks for our families, friendship and our faith in Jesus Christ. Keeping this in mind, I would like to remind everyone that our **Thanksgiving Day Mass** will take place on Thursday, November 26 at 9:00 a.m. in the church. In my opinion, this is one of the most enjoyable liturgies of the year because there is a very enthusiastic spirit present in the church that makes people sing, pray and offer to God.

One great tradition that we have at St. Alphonsus Church during Thanksgiving Mass is the blessing of food for the Thanksgiving meal. If you wish to have a portion of your Thanksgiving dinner blessed, we will have a table near the altar to place your food (and drink) and it will be blessed at the end of the liturgy.

We also ask that if you would help those less fortunate, please bring a few canned goods to the Thanksgiving liturgy. We will donate that food to our local Lemont Food Pantry who does a magnificent job helping those who are in need.

If you are unable to attend our Thanksgiving Day liturgy, then I encourage everyone to spend a few moments in prayer and reflect on everything we are thankful for. Here is a prayer from the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops about giving thanks to God for what we have

*Lord, we thank you for the goodness
of our people and for the spirit of justice
that fills this nation.
We thank you for the beauty
and fullness of our land.
We thank you for our work and our rest,
for one another, and for our homes.
We thank you, Lord:
accept our thanksgiving on this day.
We pray and give thanks
through Jesus Christ our Lord.*

Welcome Guests and Visitors. We are so glad that you are here and invite you to join us in thanksgiving for God's action in our lives. Our goal is to provide a spiritual home where all are welcome, where the healing, reconciling love of God flows through us to all people. In this way, we believe that the Church is the sacrament of God's presence in the world.

"Please come to Mass early enough not to disrupt. Leave late enough not to insult (the Mass does not end until the final blessing). Worship reverently enough not to distract. And dress proudly enough not to offend."

Reflecting on God's Word

Political power meets spiritual power in today's conversation between Jesus and Pilate. Are you the King of the Jews? Pilate asks Jesus (John 18:33). Pilate is concerned about whether Jesus is a Roman rule, just as the Jewish leaders see Jesus as a threat to their authority. Jesus is thus either guilty of speaking blasphemy by presenting himself as one who inaugurates the reign of God.

Jesus, however, speaks not about himself as a king but about that does not belong to this world (John 18:36). This kingdom may not be of this world but it is in this world's Kingdom is present in Jesus as one who comes to bear witness to the truth. And what is that God so loved the world that he gave his only Son, so that everyone who believes in him might not perish but might have eternal life (John 3:16).

Jesus is the Word become flesh who made his dwelling among us so that we might see his glory, the glory of the Father's only Son, full of grace and truth (John 1:14). The glory was the hour of the cross, the hour not of political power, but God's power shining through human weakness into the darkness, revealing self-sacrificing love so that we might have life.

Political power tends to be an upward climb into domination that must be protected at all costs. It frequently leads to isolation and abuse, to clinging to power. Spiritual power is having the strength to trust God and surrender so that God can reign in our lives, not by political alliances, but through human weakness and surrender to God.

The readings today challenge us to walk away from the world so that we might inherit our share of God's kingdom. How we live our lives directly reflects our love for God.

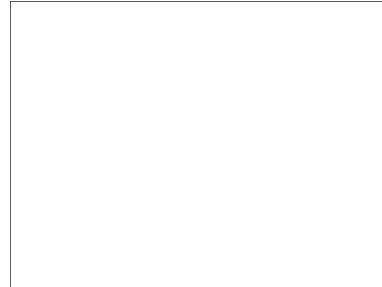
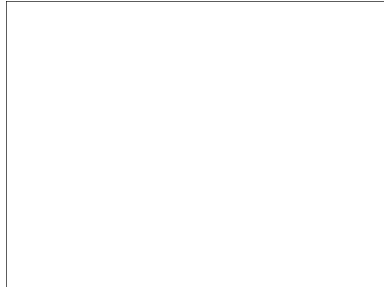
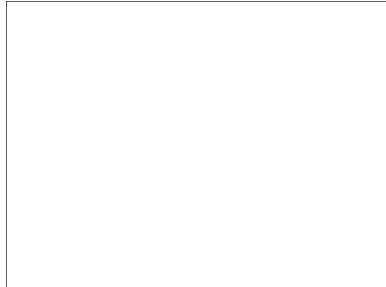

HOW DO CATHOLICS RESPOND TO ACTS OF TERRORISM?

The reactions of Pope Francis and other Catholic leaders have given us some good examples to follow, which are summarized as follows:

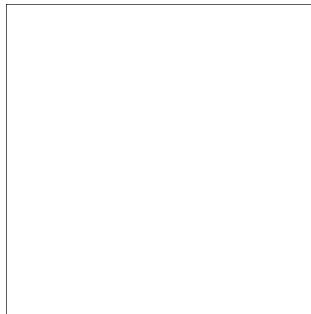
Solidarity & Prayer- Pope Francis said: I am close to the people of France, to the families of the victims, and to the prayers for all of them. He called all to join him in prayer in entrusting the defenseless victims of the tragedy to the merciful hands of God.

Condemn Evil- The killing of the innocent, whatever the motivation, must be absolutely and unconditionally condemned. Pope Francis described the terrorism in Paris as an unspeakable attack on the dignity of the human person. The use of God's name to justify this path is a blasphemy.

Avoid Hatred- The horrific scenes out of Paris, along with other acts of terror, can easily lead us to be consumed by anger and hatred toward those who carried out these crimes. In a statement issued the day after the attack, Pope Francis said: "The 130 victims of the 11th of November in Paris prayed for the grace of a firm heart, without hatred."

Support Peacemakers- The terrorist attacks in Paris remind us that we are dealing with a worldwide structural violence. Pope Francis sees what is happening as a piece of the piecemeal Third World War. This is a war that requires international cooperation and goodwill on the part of people of different faiths and nations.

Trust in Christ We can find hope in the words of Christ: In the world you will have trouble, but take courage; I have conquered the world (Jn 16:33). We must stand firm, girded in truth, clothed with righteousness (Eph 6:14).



ADVENT STARTS NEXT WEEK

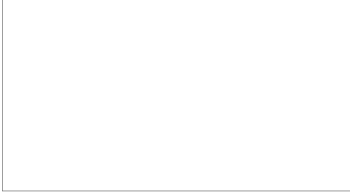

The Catholic Campaign for Human Development (CCHD) continues to advance our mission of eradicating poverty in economically-distressed communities. Our Holy Father's most recent address to Congress on September 24 of this year instructed

Our efforts must aim at restoring hope, righting wrongs, maintaining commitments, and thus promoting the dignity of individuals and of peoples. We must move forward together, as one in a renewed spirit of fraternity and cooperating generously for the common good.

Pope Francis' words resonate deeply with the CCHD. By funding communities through CCHD, we actively work together towards eliminating systemic oppression.

Organizations supported by CCHD work to build long-term solutions that will allow future generations to have a dignified quality of life. For example, *Mujeres Unidas* (Women United) of St. Eulalia has created a women-owned catering worker cooperative that has worked for the past to provide healthy food options in the Maywood area.

Mujeres Unidas radically changes the way low-income women can participate in the economy both as workers and business owners. They are able to use their talents in cooking and event planning, while maintaining oversight and direction of their cooperative. CCHD supports *Mujeres Unidas* because it exemplifies shared economic development that builds strong leaders and strong families.

The CCHD annual collection is the primary source of funding for CCHD's anti-poverty grants and education programs in Cook and Lake Counties. Fifty percent of the collection stays here in the Archdiocese to fight poverty in our communities, and the other 50 percent goes to funding programs nationwide.

The collection weekend is November 21-22. Help us defend human dignity and show Christ's charity to those in need. 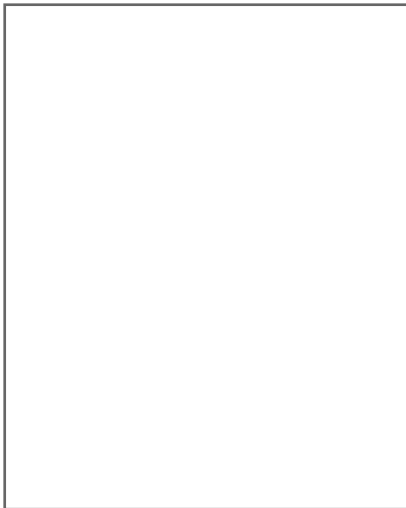
