Next week we celebrate the Third Sunday of Advent. It is considered "*Gaudete Sunday*" or "*Rejoice Sunday*". Reflecting on God's Word

On most days since early October, the students in the college residence in which I live have been eagerly and insistently bouncing Christmas carols off walls and into hallways. It began with occasional songs on the piano. Soon after, the Christmas CDs were brought out, and a week later one of them came upon an old turntable and some Sinatra Christmas LPs. As they left for Thanksgiving vacation, they each reminded me that the radio would begin playing Christmas music all day long on the day after Thanksgiving. As a result of all this I've found myself wondering what it is that's driven these twenty-year-olds toward such early visions of Christmas sugarplums.

I've come to believe that beneath all the glitter draped and swagged with ribbons and bows over these days, deeper longings are at play, longings beyond desire for the newest iPod or the latest cell phone, longings for community or healed relationships, longings too for peace among nations and for some sort of equality among people.

Curiously, such deepened longings are never marketed by any hype. Yet like Christmas spirit, they just seem to sprout wherever the human spirit finds a niche. I suppose one could make the observation that a twenty-year-old's longing for Christmas is little more than leftover nostalgia for childhood Santas and once-upon-a-time daydreams. Maybe so. Yet Paul once wrote to the Philippian community that such urgings for goodness all begin with God and that ultimately "the one who began a good work in you will continue to complete it until the day of Christ Jesus" (Philippians 1:6). In other words, these deeper longings, they seem to be God's doing, and who are we to put them on a timetable?




PUT ON JOY

Today, Baruch speaks of the splendor that lies ahead for the city of Jerusalem and for all of us, regardless of where home is for us. Throw off strife, he tells us, and put on joy. Like a favorite old sweatshirt, joy fits, and how warm it keeps us, even when the winds blow cold.

Paul knows of this joy as he pens his letter to the Philippians, praying that they may grow in their ability to discern what is righteous and good. And Luke speaks to us of John, who was foretold by Isaiah and who sings a similar song—"Prepare the way of the Lord," for salvation is at hand.

A man ahead of his time, Baruch spent his days joyfully awaiting a distant glory. On this Second Sunday of Advent, Paul and John know that this glory is upon us.





Religious Education Update

MID-TERM ASSESSMENTS The first half of the program year will be coming to a close in a few weeks. Before we break for the holidays, the children will be given an assessment to provide feedback on how they have retained the core concepts thus far for their grade-level. There are no grades given... these are not like school exams. Please help your child to review what has been covered to this point, but try to avoid the perception that they are studying to perform well on a test. The children don't need more anxiety put on them. We just want them to grow in their understanding of the Catholic faith, leading to a deeper relationship with God through Jesus.

TOP 10 MISTAKES PARENTS OF TEENS MAKE

The Christmas season is one focused on family. Advent is a time where we are introspective. That introspection can include ways that we can improve as parents. The following are suggestions from a blog called *Mere Disciple*. I'll hit on 4 this week and the remaining 6 over the next 2 weeks.

6. Trying to be your teen's best friend. Your teen doesn't need another friend; they need a parent. Even through their teens, your child needs a dependable, confident, godly authority figure in their life. As parents we are called to provide a relational context characterized by wisdom, protection, love, support, and empowerment. As Christian parents we're called to bring God's flourishing rule into our family's life. That can't happen if we're busy trying to befriend our teen. Trying to be your teen's friend actually cheats them out of having these things in their lives.


Sometimes parents think that a strong relationship with their teen means having a strong friendship—but there's a fine line that shouldn't be crossed. You should be *friendly* to your teen but you shouldn't be your teen's friend. They have lots of friends, they only have one or two parents—so be the parent your teen needs you to be.

5. Holding low expectations for your teen. Johann Goethe once wrote, "Treat a man as he is and he will remain as he is. Treat a man as he can and should be, and he will become as he can and should be." All of us rise to the unconscious level of expectation we set for ourselves and perceive from others. During the teenage years, it's especially important to slowly put to death the perception that your teen is still "a kid." They are *emerging leaders*, and if you engage them as such, you will find that over time, they unconsciously take on this mantle for themselves. Yes, your teen can be moody, self-absorbed, irresponsible, etc., but your teen can also be brilliant, creative, selfless, and mature. Treating them like "kids" will reinforce the former; treating them as emerging leaders will reinforce the latter.

4. Not prioritizing youth group/church involvement. This one is one of my personal pet peeves. I simply do not understand parents who expect and want their kids to have a dynamic, flourishing faith, and yet don't move heaven and earth to get them connected to both a youth group and local church.

Don't be the parent who is soft on these two commitments, but pushes their kid in schooling, sports, etc. In general, what you sow into determines what you reap; if you want to reap a teenager who has a genuine, flourishing faith, don't expect that to happen if you're ok with their commitment to youth group/church to be casual and half-hearted.

It is with much joy and anticipation that I invite all of you to join me to welcome the beginning of the Jubilee of Mercy. The Jubilee of Mercy, proclaimed by Pope Francis begins on December 8, 2015 and concludes with the feast of Christ the King on November 20, 2016.

The Jubilee of Mercy is a graced opportunity for all of us to appreciate more deeply how the mercy of God has taken hold of our lives and, at the same time, how we can bring that mercy into the world through our own actions and the way we live our lives. The Jubilee of Mercy will be celebrated in the Archdiocese of Chicago with a full schedule of events and array of resources. Among these are:

- The commencement of the Jubilee with the opening of the Holy Door on Sunday, December 13 at Holy Name Cathedral.
- The designation of 32 pilgrimage sites throughout the Archdiocese, where the faithful can receive indulgences.
- A special weekly resource, *One Word at a Time*, developed for parishes and individuals to help put merciful actions into practice is now available in English, Spanish and Polish.
- Stories related to the Jubilee of Mercy will appear regularly in our Archdiocesan newspapers, the Catholic New World and Chicago Católico.
- A monthly video segment, "Mercy Moments," will highlight testimonials from individuals and how they experienced or encountered God's mercy.
- Fr. Louis Cameli's newest book, *Rejoicing in Mercy: A Prayer Commentary on the Gospel of Luke*.
- "Adopt a Work of Mercy" pamphlet, with a call to all Catholics to commit to one of the corporal or spiritual works of mercy.



Jubilee Year of Mercy

December 6, 2015 Second Sunday of Advent

This Tuesday, the Solemnity of the Immaculate Conception, Pope Francis will open the “Holy Door” in Saint Peter’s Basilica, symbolically opening the *Jubilee Year of Mercy*. In today’s scriptures, Baruch confidently anticipates God’s healing of the brokenness of humanity, and Paul sees God bringing our discernment, knowledge, and love to fulfillment. Our experience of life and of ourselves can make such prophecies seem wildly optimistic, even hopelessly naïve. Pope Francis challenges us to live this Jubilee Year as a graced time, when God’s mercy reawakens our enthusiasm to live our baptismal call as gospel people, our hope renewed and ourselves recommitted to selfless charity. Notice that in Luke’s Gospel today, God bypasses the religious elite and politically powerful to speak to a humble believer in the barren desert the saving word that will transform history. So God’s mercy continues to accomplish humanity’s salvation *in* and *through* ordinary, flawed, and least likely instruments—even us.

What is it? ...

When & Where? ...It will take place during the 11 a.m. Mass on Sunday, December 13th. Children will be called forward following the Opening Prayer to process out of the worship space to the Church Hall in the lower level of the church. They will return just prior to the Presentation of the Gifts.

Who? ... Children in grades K-4. Children younger than this are generally unable to participate consciously and actively in liturgical celebrations. It is not a child-minding event.

GIFT CARDS MUST BE WRAPPED IN A BOX. NO BAGS PLEASE.


