A Year of Mercy

The year 2016 has been designated Pope Francis and the Roman Catholic Church as "**Jubilee Year of Mercy**". It is a time in which we try to realize God's mercy in our own lives and, in turn, share His compassion of Jesus Christ towards one another in everything we do. The atmosphere at St. Alphonus Church has been one that has focused on being merciful and compassionate.

One of the most powerful sacraments of mercy took place this weekend. 2nd Graders from our St. Alphonus Religious Education Program and St. Alphonsus St. Patrick School participated in the **Sacrament of Reconciliation** for the very first time.

Through expressing their mistakes and receiving a penance and absolution, our young boys and girls promise to make a change in their lives for the future. As they continue on their journey of faith, they will grow in a wonderful way and be prepared to receive the Eucharist the first time in April.

Speaking of the celebration of the Eucharist, St. Alphonus Church offers an opportunity to receive the Eucharist in a Gluten-free form. If you have a medical condition and would prefer to receive the Eucharist in this form, please approach the Eucharistic Minister on the right side (the Baptismal font side) of the Church.

Now that the weather is turning frigid, it usually marks the beginning of the cold and flu season. If you are sick or think you might be contagious, then it is a perfect opportunity to receive God's mercy and remain at home. Don't forget that you can watch the weekend Mass on TV, "**Sunday Mass at Mercy Home**" on WGN-TV, Channel 9 at 9:30 a.m. on Sunday mornings.

Let us try to understand that we are called to have a faith that encourages us to be considerate of others and act in a merciful way. By doing so, we can practice our baptismal promises encourage us by loving God and our neighbor. Then we will truly celebrate "**Jubilee Year of Mercy**".

Annual Catholic Appeal

Reflecting on God's Word

Do whatever he tells you, is what today's Gospel suggests (John 2:5). Perhaps too pointedly, because it just may turn out that none of what he tells us to do is that as it may, life does serve up new wine.

Yet as always the question remains to anyone who knows what we are being told to do? How does one read the signs of personal times? A good marker, it would seem, is to pay attention to the gifts. It may not be the only marker, but certainly one not to be ignored. St. Paul writes that our strengths and talents come from the Spirit and that each is given for some benefit. Other talents are given for the common good, which seems to be a better way of putting it, because it broadens our view and from understanding of family benefit or preference. It may be that the old wine does not quench our personal thirst, but that the new wine is for the common good.

So when the old wine runs out and we are offered the new wine, we are considering whether we are being called to some new role in life. It may be that life is ratcheting up our participation, calling us to make some new contributions we have not even considered. And we may be surprised. It may enrich the taste of life.

SURPRISES

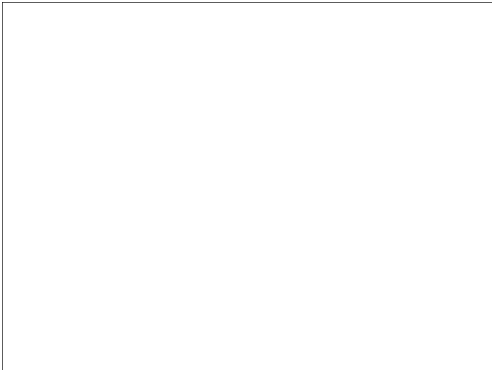

Anybody who has planned a wedding or similar event knows that they are filled with opportunities for surprises. For the groom in today's Gospel story, who has no direct contact with Jesus, the pleasant surprise came because he had paid attention and had faith in Jesus.

We may think that the point of today's familiar story of the Cana is that when we have faith in Jesus, our lives will be pleasantly changed. A Christian, however, has to broaden perspective and realize that to have faith in Christ means that somebody's life not his or her own will be surprised for the better.

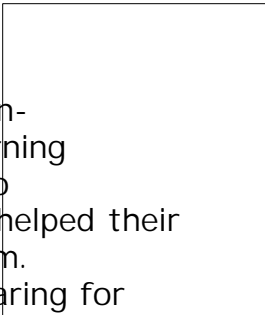

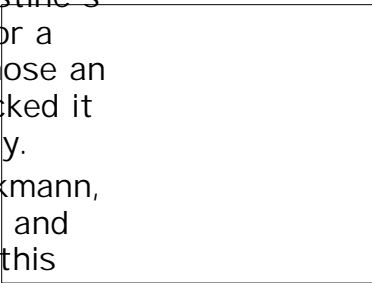


WHAT'S HAPPENING IN... SECOND GRADE

LESSONS LEARNED FROM MARTIN LUTHER KING

King always promoted peace, love and goodwill rather than hate and violence. (4) Live a passion-driven life, emphasizing the importance of following dreams and pursuing interests and talents. (5) The right to have a voice, to stand up for beliefs and to not remain silent otherwise democracy is put at risk. Change starts with each of us.

Bring in any blessed palms you may have at home to be used for this service. Baskets will be in the back of the church for you to place the palms in starting next weekend January 23rd & 24th.

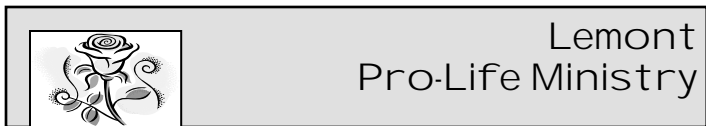
After this service, a pot-luck breakfast will be served at Church Hall. Bring a hot or cold dish to share with everyone.



Jubilee Year of Mercy January 17, 2016~Second Sunday in Ordinary Time

Mary, whom Catholic tradition names Mother of Mercy, at Cana interceded with her Son to show mercy toward the bridal couple: Son, they have no wine. But he does more! Jesus' transformation of water into wine is a sign (John's term for miracle) that God's marriage with the whole human race has begun in Jesus' person and ministry, a marriage that will be consummated on the cross. It is finished - we are saved! But before Jesus acts, Mary instructs the servers: *prepare the way* for Jesus' miracle of mercy: Do whatever he tells you. During *this Jubilee Year of Mercy*, Mother Church, like Mother Mary, instructs us to share its manifold gifts, some of which Paul lists in today's second reading: *generous service to the human family*. Thus *prepare the way* for Jesus' new miracles of mercy, transforming life sometimes stagnant water into refreshing wine of God's mercy.

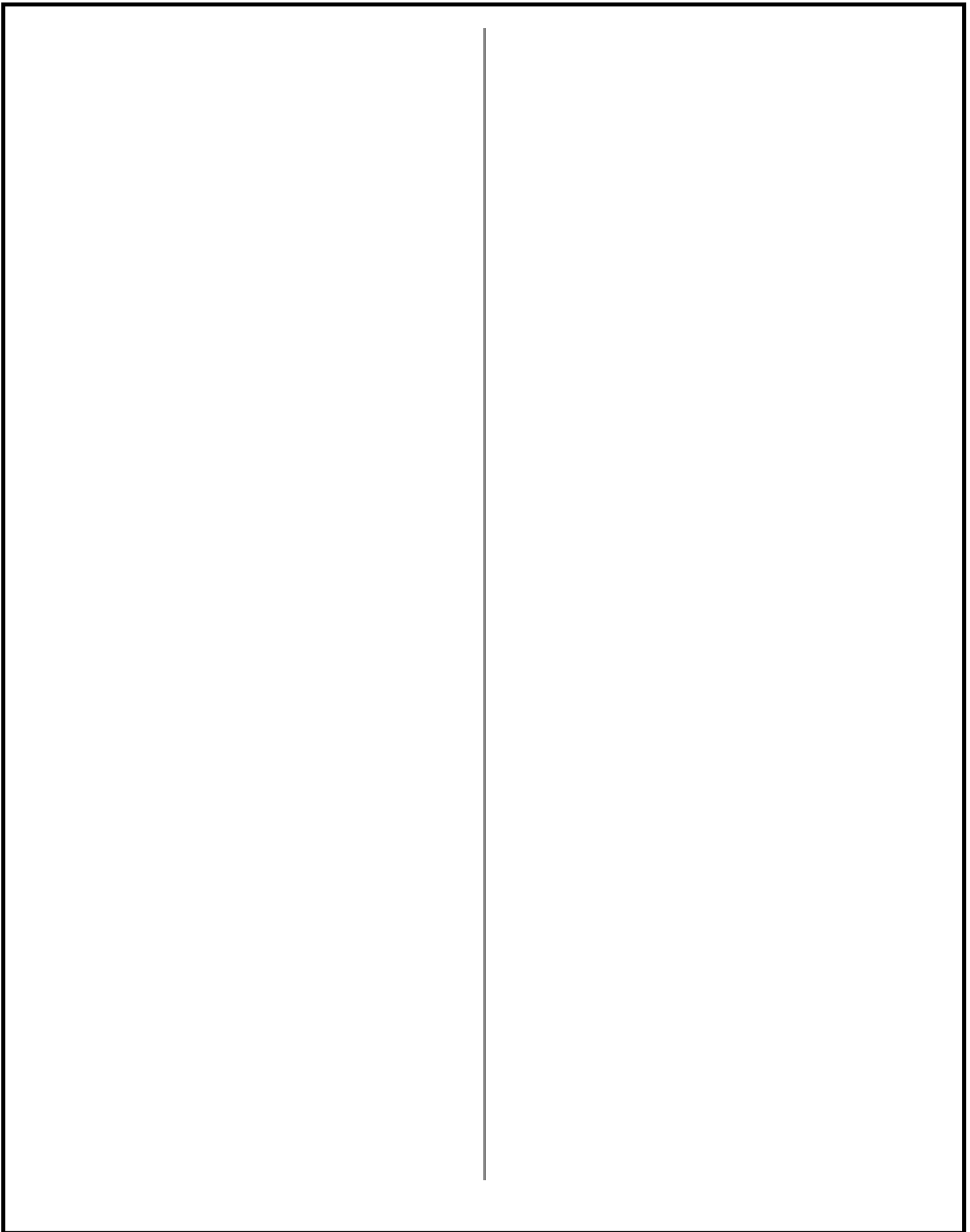

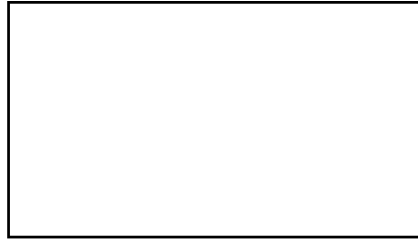
