Ordinary Time

Last Tuesday, Jan. 10th, we began the season of **Ordinary Time**. As we enter the longest season of the Church year, it might be a good opportunity to reflect on the past Advent and Christmas seasons and their impact on our lives.

Welcome Guests and Visitors . . . We're so glad that you're here and invite you to join us in thanksgiving for God's action in our lives. Our goal is to provide a spiritual home where all are welcome, where the healing, reconciling, liberating love of God flows through us to all people. In this way, we believe that the Church is the sacrament of God's saving presence in the world.

"Please come to Mass early enough not to disrupt. Leave late enough not to insult (the Mass does not end until the final blessing). Worship reverently enough not to distract. And dress proudly enough not to offend."

Reflecting on God's Word

To be a disciple of Jesus Christ means to learn from him. He is the teacher, we the students; he is the master, we his servants. But what is it we are to learn? One important title for Jesus is the Lamb of God who has come to serve by taking away our sin. He serves by leading us to participate in the holiness of God. We are to do the same for others.

Jesus came to understand his own calling by reading and praying the book of the prophet Isaiah, especially the four poems found there called the Servant Songs. Today we hear part of the second song in which the servant professes how he was formed as servant from the womb, not only to bring back Israel to God, but to be a light to the nations, so God's "salvation may reach to the ends of the earth" (Isaiah 49:6).

Those who serve Jesus as disciples are to join in this work of bringing God's salvation to the world. Paul recognizes this in his greeting to the Corinthians, noting his call to be an apostle of Christ, one sent by God to the church at Corinth, which has been made holy in Christ and called to be holy. Paul is sent not only to them, but to "all those everywhere who call on the name of our Lord Jesus Christ" (1 Corinthians 1:2).

God's will is our holiness. By responding to the call to know Jesus as the Lamb of God, we accept the invitation to participate in this holiness and become the vehicle for inviting others to dwell there.

THREE MISSIONS

Today we begin with one of the "servant songs" from the book of Isaiah, a song prophetic of Jesus' ministry of service. Isaiah's mission is not only to bring back the children of Jacob to gather in Israel; it is also to be "a light to the nations" (Isaiah 49:6). Jesus Christ, as servant, will be the fulfillment of the ancient prophecy and the basis of the new.

This Sunday we begin a series of readings from Paul's letter to the Corinthians. Here Paul is identified by his mission: he is an apostle of Jesus Christ. The church at Corinth to whom he addresses this letter is also identified: it is part of the universal church of God. The Corinthians are called to holiness, as are all Christians.

Though the feast of the Baptism of the Lord was celebrated last Monday, today's Gospel also alludes to the importance of that event. The reading emphasizes that Jesus "outranks" John: his baptism in the Spirit will eradicate sin. Jesus accepts John's baptism, even though it is he himself who is the Lamb of God.

Children will forget much of what was taught weeks ago, so it would be a good idea to review what they have studied the first semester... especially, if they will be taking their mid-term assessment upon their return! It will help your child's catechist if they have to spend less time reviewing, and can move on to new things.

CALLED TO PROTECT SESSIONS



We all understand the importance of teaching children rules, rules about everything from how to play nicely with one another to how to cross the street safely to how to show respect to their elders.

In response to the abuse scandal, the Archdiocese wants us to extend this common practice to teach young people rules about their bodies. Even young very young people can help keep themselves safe if they have information they need. One of the best ways to help young children protect themselves against sexual abuse is to teach them about boundaries: what boundaries are, what to do when someone violates those boundaries, and how to tell a trusted adult when that happens. Our sessions next week will make use of the "Called To Protect" program to teach only grade-appropriate concepts consistent with what child experts say children can understand, learn, and use. Our catechists will follow detailed instructions and a wide range of activities. Details were provided at the Parent Meeting in September and in the January Parent Newsletter. January is Human Trafficking Awareness Month

As January is Human Trafficking Awareness Month, Sacred Heart Domestic Violence Outreach Ministry and our Pastor Father Jacek Wrona invite you to a presentation on **Tuesday January 17, 2017 at 6:00 pm** with Cook County Sheriff Thomas Dart, who will discuss his office’s work with Human Trafficking and Sexual Exploitation.

Sheriff Thomas Dart

Sheriff Dart reformed the way Sheriff’s Police handle prostitution arrests– steering prostitutes toward rehabilitative services through the Sheriff’s Women’s Justice Program rather than jail. Sheriff Dart also launched a national campaign to target the “johns” who solicit sex and highlight their roles as catalysts for the sex trade. Since its first operation in 2011, the “National Day of Johns Arrests” has grown to include more than 80 law enforcement nationwide partners who have combined for 5,894 johns arrests. The Child Exploitation Unit, also founded under Dart, actively pursues child pornography and human trafficking cases; such work provided the foundation for his advocacy and awareness initiatives regarding websites such as Craigslist, which ultimately led to the removal of the “Adult Services” section previously listed on their website. Sheriff Dart continues to shine a light on the internet’s role in the facilitation of the sex trade while pushing for policy and legal strategies to protect the victims trafficked on the internet.
